58 Processions: Explorations in Sound and Space Through the Religious Processions of Southern Spain

LONDON November 5 2012 - Four years on, artists Duncan Whitley and James Wyness revisit their 2008 sound installation at St. Pancras Church, in a PDF multimedia publication featuring a specially edited series of sound recordings.

Listening Through Holy Week is at once an audio release; an exhibition catalogue; and a reflection on creative process between the field, the studio and the exhibition space. Available for download as a PDF, the publication features twelve embedded sound recordings, writing by Duncan Whitley, James Wyness and Katherine Hunt, introduced by Simon Day, co-director of London-based arts organisation Measure.

Across 2007-2008 artists Whitley and Wyness collaborated on a sound project centred in themes of sound and space, mapping the Holy Week processions of Seville through an elaborate series of multi-channel sound recordings. The artists examine the sonic language of the processions, exploring the role of sound in the production of emotional intensity in Seville's public and participatory representations of the Passion, as carried out by the city's fifty-eight Catholic brotherhoods across Easter Week.

The project was realised as a large-scale sound installation in the crypt of St Pancras Church, occupying and making use of the space of the crypt's labyrinthine network of passages and alcoves, the subject of Katherine Hunt's reflections in her essay *A Resurrection in Sound*.

The entire archive of Whitley and Wyness' recordings from 58 Processions can be accessed as part of a permanent collection in the British Library.
